

OPIOID USE IN MONTANA

About Opioids¹:

Opioids are a class of drug that produces a variety of effects such as pain relief, relaxation, or euphoria. Pharmaceutical opioids are prescribed by doctors to treat acute or chronic pain (for example, oxycodone). Illicit opioids include illicitly manufactured fentanyl and heroin. Both illicit and prescription opioids can lead to addiction.

Key Points:

- In 2023, 185 Montanans died from a drug overdose. Of these drug overdose deaths, 123 (68%) involved opioids.³
- About \$4.8 million was charged by Montana hospitals for opioid overdoserelated hospitalizations and emergency department visits in 2023.³
- The Department of Public Health and Human Services, in conjunction with the Montana Legislature, has worked to increase access to life-saving naloxone to Montanans and empower Montanans to help each other prevent drug overdose deaths. In 2023, over 78,000 naloxone kits were distributed throughout the state.⁴
